Adam Linder's practice relies on carefully crafted dance vocabularies to probe how choreography relates to desire, value, technology, and collective psyche. His solos and ensemble works, either for the stage or the exhibition space, incorporate text, props, costume, scenography, printed matter and musical compositions in various scales and with varying emphasis. He has presented solo and two-person exhibitions at the Museum of Contemporary Art Sydney (2023), Museum of Modern Art MoMA, New York (2020), South London Gallery (2018), Kunsthalle Basel (2017), Schinkel Pavilion, Berlin (2016), and the Institute of Contemporary Arts, London (2015). His stage works have been co-produced and presented by theatres such as HAU Hebbel am Ufer, Berlin; Kampnagel, Hamburg; deSingel, Antwerp; Sadler's Wells, London; Dampfzentrale, Bern and UCLA CAP / Redcat, Los Angeles. In 2018, CCA Wattis, San Francisco presented the survey *FULL SERVICE*, which subsequently travelled to MUDAM Luxembourg. Linder has had commissions from Sydney Dance Company (2010), Ballet de Lorraine, Nancy (2023); and will create a new work for Danish Dance Theatre, Copenhagen in 2024.

Michael Kleine's practice moves between the formats of stage design, performance, architecture, music and sculpture, always in close dialogue with the location and context. In all genres, he develops concepts for encounters between visitors, art and artists. He often integrates historical artifacts into his works. Artistic collaborations are a recurring element of his practice. His works have been shown in institutions of the visual and performing arts, including Bonner Kunstverein, Schinkelpavillon Berlin, Volksbühne Berlin, Kunstverein Leipzig, Künstlerhaus Stuttgart, Ruhrtriennale Bochum, Theater Basel, Kampnagel Hamburg, Zentrum für Kunst und Medien Karlsruhe, Hamburg State Opera, Museion Bolzano, Klosterfelde Collection Hamburg, Biennale Arte di Venezia, Philharmonie de Paris, Opéra de Reims, Radialsystem Berlin.

Roman Lemberg is a musician, composer and dramaturge. He plays keyboard instruments. He usually develops his pieces collectively with musicians from different genres as well as with amateurs. His practice encompasses various styles and genres, from electronic music and organ improvisations to arrangements of works from the classical opera repertoire. He is a member of the Junge Akademie at the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences and Humanities and researches the performance practice of music from ritual and ceremonial contexts. As an organist, he is interested in the traditions of sacred music. Performances with his contributions have been shown at the following institutions: Staatsoper Berlin, Sophiensæle Berlin, Volksbühne Berlin, Schinkelpavillon Berlin, Theater Bremen, Theater Halle, Kampnagel Hamburg, Rote Fabrik Zürich, Théâtre de l'Athenée Paris, Théâtre Imperial Compiégne, Vlaamse Opera Antwerpen/Gent.

Roman Lemberg and Michael Kleine have been working together for many years. They have realized performances, concerts and exhibitions in the following institutions, among others Musiktage Donaueschingen (2021), Volksbühne Berlin (2018), Schinkelpavillon Berlin, Klosterfelde Collection (2012/14/16), Hamburg State Opera (2007/08/11), Bonner Kunstverein (2021/23), Biennale di Venezia (2019).

Anna Fusek was born in Prague. She studied violin, recorder and piano in early music, as well as philosophy and musicology. She made her debut as a recorder player at the Philharmonie Berlin in 2007

and as a soloist on all three instruments with the Orchestra della Toscana in Florence in 2017. She conducts her own ensemble Kavka as well as the Orchestra della Toscana and the Granada Symphony Orchestra on a regular basis. As a soloist, she has worked with renowned orchestras such as the Akademie für Alte Musik Berlin, Venice Baroque Orchestra, Berliner Philharmoniker, WDR Symphony Orchestra, Collegium 1704, Orchestra II Pomo d'Oro in Europe, USA, South America and Asia. Since 2017, she has also been involved in composition and improvisation with her ensemble La Cosmologie de la Poire.

Paolo Rosso, based in Venice, founded Microclima (2011) a cultural project that has had several expressions over the years, including the cultural program at the Giardini greenhouse (2011–ongoing), the floating cinema (2020–ongoing) and the island of Sant'Andrea (2023–ongoing). Another project is RedHero (2015–ongoing), a research program and video platform dedicated to Ulan Bator and Mongolia. In parallel he organizes cultural events related to Todolí Citrus Fundació de la Comunitat Valenciana, a non-profit organization created for the study and spreading of Citrus and citriculture.
